What is a UU church meant to be? Is a UU church just a place for exploring different theological ideas and studying the stories of the world's great religions? It is a social gathering where we find and make new friends? Is it a community where we volunteer to serve our neighbors and publicly witness for justice? I think a UU church is meant to be all of these. But perhaps more importantly, I believe that our UU church is meant to be a place that helps us cultivate that deeper goodness within us and a place that offers us opportunities to live out that goodness together.

One of the three core values of our BAUUC community is "respect and compassion." These are words that call us to honor our diversity and affirm the sacred worth and dignity of every person. These are nice words to say. But they present us with some challenges if we are serious about actually making them an active part of

our daily lives.

We are people up to that challenge! I know this because I have seen this core value of respect and compassion lived out by our community in some truly beautiful ways in recent weeks.

In mid-January, a man came by BAUUC one weekend looking for help. He had unexpectedly lost his job and was sleeping outside in the cold and rain. The people he encountered at our church kindly listened to his story and did what they could to offer assistance. This man came to church on a Sunday morning to worship with us and I was able to offer him some financial help from our Minister's Discretionary Fund. Later that week, he posted a review of our church on Google. Here's part of what he said: "Being stranded here from Colorado, I painfully tried every way suggested by the big name organizations to get help getting home. At BAUUC, every person I came in contact with treated me as I would treat any other human in need and went out of their way to assist me within their means. I heard and saw intelligent, kind, loving people confer and rely on other's experiences and intelligence in helping me. The Spirit of what a church is meant to be is what the people at this wonderful place carry in their hearts."

Since the beginning of the year, one of our congregation's most dedicated volunteers has found herself homebound and suffering from intense back pain. Our Care Team and many others have reached out to her and even scheduled daily visits to support and assist her. While we aren't set up to provide ongoing medical care, we have been able to make sure this person knows she is not alone and that we are here for her. Our Care Team offers this type of supportive outreach to lots of people all the time, in the forms of home and hospital visits, cards, calls, meals and rides. This work is not a burden, but a blessed opportunity to live our values. And you can be a part of it. If you find yourself in need, please contact our Care Team. We are here for you. If you are able to visit someone, make a meal or offer a ride on occasion, contact LaVerne Nash and she will add you to our ever-growing list of helpers.

Our statement that explains this value of respect and compassion says "Our success is measured by how we include and treat each other." We don't always perfectly live up to the ideals we profess and there are times when needs go unmet. There are always limits to the resources and time that are available. But our church is a place where we get to practice the art of hospitality and compassion over and over again. So that when that hungry stranger comes or a friend is truly struggling, we are always growing in our ability to find that place of generosity and kindness in our hearts.

I look forward to seeing you at church this month. I hope you will join us on Saturday February 15 for our Stewardship Dinner. This is a time for celebrating all we love most about being a part of BAUUC. And one of the things I love most is how we genuinely strive to live out our values together here.

One of the primary duties of the Board of Directors is to draft and approve policies for church functions and activities. The Board endeavors to review each existing church policy, at least, once every two years. At the January meeting of the Board of Directors, the Board reaffirmed several existing policies, including the Pledge Requirement for Membership Policy and the Building Use and Rental Policy amongst others. In addition, the Board discussed a proposal for a new Cash Reserve Policy.

The Board discussed planning for its semi-annual retreat scheduled for the beginning of February. Amongst the items on the agenda for the retreat are: (1) reviewing our annual goals and progress toward these goals; (2) discussing the next steps for engaging the congregation in the process for updating our mission, vision and values; and, (3) looking for ways to be more inviting and inclusive to new people and groups.

Looking ahead, the Board also discussed plans for our next Congregational Meeting scheduled for Sunday March 8.

On a final note, we're looking forward to the Stewardship Dinner which will be held on Saturday February 15. With our thanks to Bob Handy and the entire Stewardship Committee for their hard work to organize and host the dinner (as well as the entire Stewardship campaign), we look forward to seeing you at the event. The Stewardship Dinner is a great opportunity to learn about the BAUUC budgeting process and how your support enables BAUUC to continue to thrive, as well as a great opportunity to celebrate everything we cherish about BAUUC.

Education for Faithful Living

I had an experience of awe and wonder hearing the flow. It was so beautiful!!! It was the first time I attentively listened to my hairdressers speaking with each other. I thought, Isn't this wonderful!!! Aren't having languages a miracle! How was this even possible! What a great achievement of humanity to communicate with many diverse languages! Did you know that there are more than 7,000 languages spoken around the globe?

Here is the thing, growing up in Syria, I learned four languages spontaneously. Armenian is my mother tongue, Arabic is my neighbors, Turkish was my grandparents' and English is for movies

and later for college. I studied French and Russian later on, but can't claim really knowing them. Although these are all distinctively separate languages, most of them are culturally intertwined; Armenian, Arabic and Turkish have the same Indo-European root and they bleed into each other. English, French and Russian do the same. If you know one or the other, you can catch few words here and there of the other. I love listening to people speaking their native language, try to hear and guess what they are saying. I watch their gestures and listen to their tone, just like you would listen to music. Languages sound like music to my ears and I open my heart to receive them.

Languages are magical and they have mysterious ways to 'get' into you. I never realized how well I knew Turkish till I was invited to translate for a delegate from Turkey who didn't know a word in Armenian. I never studied Turkish, but somehow listening to my grandparents stories and watching Turkish television they used to watch, earned me a language. Later on, entering the doctoral studies, this saved me time and money on language requirements.

We had a conversation about languages at one of our combined religious education classes with the children. One of them pointed out that I have an accent. I acknowledged his observation and said, "You do know what that means, right? That is because I know several other languages. When you hear an accent, you would know that the person knows at least one other language." Their eyes opened wide! They asked me how I say 'hi' in Arabic and Armenian. I encouraged them to teach me how to say 'hi' in the languages they know. There was Spanish and German in the room and many bright eyes happy to teach. Since then, every time we have combined class, the mention of languages will come up and will have a round of reciting words and phrases in languages present in the room. What a wonderful way to teach our children about diversity and inclusion, right?

Languages evolve and change. I am sure you are aware of the English spelling and the American spelling. Do you know how this came about? Back in the time of telegraph communication, when each letter costed money, people dropped the U in colour to save on the cost. Just this last week the Merriam-Webster dictionary has added 'they' as pronoun to refer to a single person whose gender identity is nonbinary.

Living in such a diverse city as Houston but driving around makes meeting people not easy. This means we need to be intentional in encountering other languages and accents. When such encounters happen, I follow these best practices that I would like to share with you. When someone tries to communicate with me and I don't understand, I simply ask to repeat what they said. I don't paraphrase it for them. I am very careful not to make facial gestures. Very many of us don't realize doing this, but it is extremely rude. Finally, I open my heart and ears to hear and listen. Sometimes such encounters stretch my mind and that is a good thing. That is a learning moment.

Words bridge worlds and separate them as well. We do not like walls at our borders, right? Then, why do we build them between us? Next time when you encounter a person blessed with the gift of the languages, please count this a learning moment.

Religious Education for Children & Youth in February

Nursery and Childcare

Our littlest ones are given loving care every Sunday between 9:15am and noon. The children engage in free play, hear stories from the UU Principles and Sources, sing songs, and work on age-appropriate crafts. Reservations are not necessary.

In the Classes

Sundays at 9:15am- "Our Whole Lives" Classes for K-1st Grade, room 120

Our Whole Lives is the nationally recognized 'Gold Standard' sexuality curriculum developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ. These classes are our UU sexuality education program that provides honest, accurate, and age appropriate information.

Sundays at 9:30am- "Heart and Soul"

At 9:30am on Sundays we will explore spiritual practices for children and youth, planned and led primarily by youth. A range of spiritual practices will be explored. Some examples are storytelling, crafts, music, and meditation. These practices can be used to ground, center and balance ourselves as we go through our daily lives. All children and youth are welcome to attend.

Sundays at 11:00am

Spirit Play (Pre-K) Room 115

In Spirit Play, after hearing a story, the children choose their activity from an array of choices. The Spirit Play stories are tweaked to be age appropriate.

Love Surrounds Us (K-1st Grade) Room 120

February 2: "Acceptance II" - The children take a tour of the church Building.

February 9: "Love Surrounds Us in Ritual" – The children learn about the Flower Communion and participate in one.

February 16: "Our History I" - The children hear a story about Universalist circuit-rider Rev. Nathaniel Stacy. They make a history chain and a UU magnet.

February 23: "Our History II" - Today's story highlights Henry David Thoreau's cabin and his simple life-style.

Moral Tales (2nd-3rd Grades) Room 114

February 2: "Welcome One and All II" - Using a folk tale from the Middle East, the children consider the value we put on behavior.

February 9: "Welcome One and All III" - The children discuss the value of appearance and play a game about Welcoming All.

February 16: "Seeing Other with Awe" - The children practice being welcoming and consider 'What if a Messiah is among us?'.

February 23: "Do Unto Others" - The children hear the parable of the Good Samaritan as an example of the Golden Rule.

Sing to the Power (4th-5th Grade) Room 112

February 2: "The Power of Silence I" - The children learn about the power of the air and the silence. When they clear away the buzz of constant distractions they can listen to what is truly important.

February 9: "The Power of Silence II" - In this session the children practice silence themselves and by listening intently to the sounds around them, they learn about the cost of the incessant noise of our modern world.

February 16: "The Power of Shine I" - The group hears a story about a boy who is bullied at school. They practice interrupting bullying situations.

February 23: The Power of Shine II" - The group hears a story about how words can hurt. They practice substituting 'putdowns' with 'pull-up'.

Climate Crisis Task Force

BAUUC's new Climate Crisis Task Force met for the first time on Thursday January 16. Our goal is to organize and prioritize responses to the climate crisis for both individuals and the congregation. At our first meeting we identified three paths which we plan to implement:

- 1. Educate ourselves, our congregation and our community on the immediateness of the Climate Crisis through continuation of Green Sanctuary and other educational programs.
- 2. Propose that the church adopt a formal statement at the March all church meeting stating our understanding of climate change and our goals for responding, such as, adopting the Unitarian Universalist Association's "Build a Movement for a Green New Deal" (https://www.uua.org/action/statements/build-movement-green-new-deal), endorsement of the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act proposed by the Citizen's Climate Lobby (CCL) (https://citizensclimatelobby.org/energy-innovation-and-carbon-dividend-act/), commit to the "Ready for 100" campaign proposed by the Sierra Club (https://www.sierraclub.org/ready-for-100/campaign).
- 3. Undertake projects which will reduce our carbon footprint of the church building, such as energy conservation and installation of solar electric panels.
